Lyn has taught Secondary English, been a Secondary and Elementary Reading Specialist, a Reading Supervisor, and retired as an Elementary Principal. After 35 years of service in public education, her most recent position was serving as a National Assessment of Educational Progress assessor for the US Department of Education. DKGNJ State Convention on April 13, 2024 Keynote Speaker Dr. Denise Ammeraal Furlong, Ed. D., ED. M.




We are thrilled to welcome Dr. Denise Ammeraal Furlong as our luncheon keynote speaker at this year's state convention.

Skipping Stones Multicultural Award as an outstanding resource for multicultural education. This book is a practical guide for the early career educator, the seasoned educator, and the administrator looking to meet the needs of Multilingual/English Learners. Dr. Furlong attended the 2023 DKG International Conference in Phoenix, Arizona to accept her book award and while there met our DKGNJ State President Irene Maskaly.

This book gives the educational community time to pause and reflect on classroom activities, teaching styles, approaches to student feelings, attitude toward the Multilingual Learner, and insight into possible family situations or trauma that they have experienced. In 2023 we gave away 7 Teachers Helping Teachers classroom grants, each valued up to \$250. The winners came to our February 2023 meeting and enthusiastically explained their projects. They enjoyed food, pictures and conversation with our members. All were given information about DKG. We also awarded a female student at Stockton University who is currently student teaching a \$750 Book Award to help defray tuition and the expenses incurred while student teaching. The Dean of Education from Stockton attended our meeting as we presented this award. We are giving away Teachers Helping Teachers grants again this year as well as a Book Award to a student teacher.

We also donated money to several area charities, including the Atlantic City Rescue Mission and "A Night to Shine", a Tim Tebow very special prom for adults, young and old with developmental disabilities. One of our sisters organizes and volunteers at this event every year. While we have supported an Atlantic County Women's center with personal care items and clothing, our focus has shifted to books for children at the Atlantic City Day Nursery. 
