The committees that do not yet have a chair include World Fellowship, Committee on the Arts, Installation of Officers, Exhibits and Record Books, and State Motivator.

The chair of Exhibits and Record Books is responsible for assembling and exhibiting materials significant to the current state activities. In other words, this committee is responsible for arranging to have exhibits at convention showing the work that is DKGNJ does throughout the year. In odd numbered years, the exhibits are the Chapter President's Books which are displayed to show what the chapter has accomplished during the Chapter President's biennium. In the alternate years, this committee arranges for various committees to display what that chapter has done. For example, there could be a display created by the UN Liaison showing how DKGNJ has interacted with the UN.

The Installation Committee consists of 2 or 3 members, designated as state chairs. The responsibility of this committee is to plan and execute the installation of new state officers at the DKGNJ state convention which takes place in odd numbered years.

One of the initiatives of DKG International provides support to non-members pursuing higher education in our member countries. The chair of the state World Fellowship communicates with the chapters to advise members of World Fellowship recipients and encourages members to communicate with World Fellowship recipients. If a recipient is studying at a university near one of our DKGNJ chapters, the chair of World Fellowship could encourage that chapter to attend a chapter meeting.

The Arts Committee Chair will coordinate an art exhibit at state convention to highlight the works of our many talented members. She would determine an application process, the type of medium to include in the exhibit, and work with the chapter representatives to select pieces to be displayed. The chair of the committee along with the chapter representatives are also encouraged to provide a workshop at convention.

The State Motivator gets us in the right frame of mind before meetings. She provides uplifting messages that encourage and motivate us to accomplish our goals.

- Leisure arts teachers (Zumba, yoga, swimming, skiing, etc.)
- Master Gardener teachers
- · Medical teachers
- · Paraprofessionals: aides, assistants
- · Religious teachers
- Trade-school teachers

#### NU CHAPTER

Happy 50th to NU Chapter!

Nu Chapter was born April 24, 1971. Parent Eta Chapter installed officers of "baby chapter #13" in Atlantic City. Nu Chapter was known as the mavericks and led by Laura Lewis (1971-94) during its early years.

In 1971, there were twenty-eight members which swelled to sixty-six members by 1986. President Laura Lewis (1984-86) suggested an expansion and in 1988, Nu Chapter became the parent to Sigma.

Since 1988, there has been an ebb and flow of membership. In 2021, our small but mighty group now stands at 41 members who represent a varied cross section of outstanding women educators from several towns/districts in Burlington County. It is with great pride we can say that 19 Nu Chapter sisters have held 8 State Offices, 29 State Chair positions and 1 International.

Our Service and Outreach to school and community is constant and strives to address the Seven Purposes of the Society. The annual Holiday tradition in honor and memory of a dedicated sister, The Doris Garland Project, runs in conjunction with Saint Vincent De Paul. During the fall Pi collected money to help provide food for the KidzPack program operated by the Kitchen of Hope. Every Friday, the backpack program provides school-aged children with nutritionally balanced meals to sustain them and their families over the weekend. These packs are carefully designed to allow children (with minimal supervision) to prepare meals for themselves easily.

The winter project involved the Together Teen Center, a walk-in shelter in southern New Jersey, providing 24-hour emergency shelter for youth, ages 9-18, who find themselves in need of a safe place to live. Together provides emergency housing for youth who have experienced abuse, neglect, human trafficking or those youth who have runaway or are in need of safe housing due to a variety of circumstances. Pi sisters collected money to provide pajamas, underwear and/or Christmas gifts for teens at the center.

The spring project involved the Food Bank of South Jersey's Mobile Meals program. Nutritious food is delivered to low income neighborhoods to feed children and their families. The money collected was the equivalent of 4200 meals!

Pi's service projects were an absolute success. The total amount given to the projects was \$2540.



#### SIGMA CHAPTER

Sigma did not let the pandemic prevent us from celebrating milestones. Keeping socially distant, thirty-year pins were delivered to Elle Hecht, Nancy Ireland, and Roberta Sallee. Thank you for your years of loyalty to DKG!

For a donation to our grant fund, members were able to single out some outstanding women who were acknowledged and awarded certificates at one of our functions. Realizing that some of the people who impressed us were men, the name was changed to The


