# Chapter Rules: Reminders - What's Next? - Thank You!

Reminders: We need both an electronic and hard copy of your chapter rules. Final, approved, electronic copies of chapter rules are due June 1, 2015. Hard copies may be either mailed by or brought to the AZS meeting June 6, 2015. This deadline is very important so that the new state rules and bylaws chairs will have the current information.

## What's Next? - Keeping Chapter Rules Up-To-Date

To keep chapters current, consider the following:

- Ask the chapter recording secretary to make a copy of the approved minutes signed by the president for the chapter Rules and Bylaws Chair(s).
- Have the secretary include a section labeled "Actions Taken", "Motions Approved", etc. at the end of chapter minutes. This makes it quick and easy for anyone who needs to go through minutes to identify policy changes or items that may warrant a change in chapter rules. If, according to your chapter rules, they can be amended by a simple majority vote, and members have received or do not need prior notification of changes to the chapter rules before voting on them, those changes can be incorporated after the chapter meeting without an additional vote.
- Make it a responsibility of the Rules and Bylaws Committee to update the chapter rules, if necessary, at the end of each year and submit updated chapter rules to the AZS Rules and Bylaws Committee each biennium, as stipulated in the AZS Bylaws, Article V Section B.4, so that their records are accurate. Actually, they could be updated at the end of each chapter meeting at which actions have been taken that necessitate a change in the chapter rules.
- Should you decide to have a chapter handbook, be sure to update it as well as changes occur, such as changes in officer and committee chair responsibilities, changes of location for chapter paraphernalia, etc
- Finally, when your chapter History and Archives Committee chair assembles, organizes, and updates selected materials for the archives at Georgian Court University, consider keeping a copy of your latest chapter rules in the archives.

**Thank You Chapter Rules and Bylaws Committees!!!** You have truly succeeded in making your chapter rules rule! It has been our privilege and honor to work with so many wonderful, dedicated and diligent sisters. We are so appreciative of your commitment, enthusiasm, and support.



# AZS State and International Scholarships and Stipends

The *Elizabeth M. Bozearth State Scholarship* is available to members of DKG-AZS who are members in good standing for 3 or more years and have been accepted into a graduate degree program in an approved institution of higher learning. The application deadline is December 15.

AZS Professional Growth Stipends are available to members for professional growth, personal development, research, travel related to one's field of work, educational and/or community service projects and conference attendance related to one's field. Members can apply individually or as a team member. The next application deadline is December 15.

The *Margaret Abel Scholarship Award* provides a grant-in-aid to assist outstanding women preparing to enter the field of education. Applicants must be a female graduate or undergraduate student who has begun her professional program leading to an initial teacher certification, a resident of New Jersey and enrolled in a four year college or university. The application deadline is December 15.



ETA has awarded stipends to and offers congratulations to three Burlington County teachers to assist in the funding of excellent teaching practices in their classrooms. Selection of the awardees was based an application which described the worthiness of the teacher's project. Dr. Melissa McQuoid of Burlington Township High School received \$400 for the purchase of echo chambers and ethanol measuring devices to be used with her biology students to measure evidence of the release of energy from the breakdown of food molecules in living cells. Mindy Janson of Edgewater Park's Magowan School received \$200 to enhance the writing workshop experience for her first grade students with each student receiving a hard bound copy of his/her original compositions. Annie Wood of Burlington Township High School received \$400 to support the Burlington Township Freshman Integrating Resources and Service Learning Together Project. The freshmen students will assemble food packages for the organization Stop Hunger Now. The meal packages are shipped around the world to support school feeding programs and crisis relief. It is a privilege to recognize such outstanding educators and their worthwhile projects.

Eta sister, Jeanne DelColle, has been published!! Jeanne, an Instructional Development and Strategic Partnerships Specialist at Richard Stockton College, in collaboration with Claudine Keenan, Dean of Education at Richard Stockton College, authored the Co-Teaching Partnerships for Excellence in the Age of Accountability: A Preliminary study of the Effects of Co-Teaching in Student Teaching. Accountability measures for educators have made districts reluctant to accept teacher candidates for clinical experience in a traditional take-over model. Difficulty placing teacher candidates prompted Richard Stockton College to research innovative student teaching models to strengthen clinical partnerships with P-12 districts. Based on a model from St. Cloud State University, a pilot study began at Stockton which identified co-teaching strengths in professionalism, teaching time, student learning, and cooperating teacher growth, with implications for strengthening future research.


