1. “Your Passport to Adventure: Off the Beaten Path – Exploring the Nature Side of NJ”

2. “Empowering Resilience: Emotional Intelligence’s Role in Building Self-Awareness and Management”

3. “The DKG Stipend Awarded Program – The 3 R’s Project: Read, Write and Record”

This workshop will give a detailed explanation of the 3R's Project. The 3R's Project is designed to increase special education students' motivation to read while celebrating them as authors and writers. As a part of this project, special education students are recorded reading picture books and short chapter books to create a catalog of read-alouds that are then shared with younger students. Students are also recorded reading their own writings to be shared with their families and school staff. The workshop will include time for attendees to brainstorm and develop their own ideas for stipend funded projects.

4. “Heart Health For Her”

6. “Mothers of Invention”

Carol Simon Levin portrays Lillian Moller Gilbreth, motion study pioneer and “Cheaper by the Dozen” mother of 12. She will also share the stories of other overlooked women innovators, including many women of color. From Margaret Knight (19th century “Female Edison”) to Hollywood superstar Hedy Lamarr, these “Mothers of Invention” changed our lives, yet their accomplishments were all too often ignored, discounted or credited to others.

7. “Let the Glitter Settle: Bringing Presence and Awareness into our Lives and Learning Spaces”
