She served as a faculty member there for 36 years, having retired as professor emerita in 2018.

Jane has been married to her husband, Andy, for 17 years. For six months each year, they live in a log cabin in NY that he designed and built. This has served as home for her two stepchildren, Stephanie and Casey, who in turn have made her a grandma to four grandchildren: Audriana (6), Casey Jr. (5), Grayson (3) and Shelby (2). 
serve as state а chair. This form can also be found on our website. state By becoming involved at the state level, you will begin to impact education in our state as well as worldwide.

Her October 2016 presentation to her DKG New Jersey Alpha Chapter, entitled *"Teacher Leadership Ignites New Jersey,"* was based on her doctoral dissertation, *"Perceptions of Highly Recognized Teachers about Approaches to Teacher Leadership."* She left Alpha members energized to

lead their schools.

Woods-Murphy leads by example. The 2010 New Jersey Teacher of the Year has served in many leadership positions, including the Board of Directors of the National Education Association



Foundation, a public charity founded by educators for educators to improve public education for all students. Woods-Murphy was also an American Achieves Fellow from 2011-2015. This organization works to align education to economic opportunity in ways that work for all, preparing everyone to succeed in the 21st century by building a thriving economy and democracy. From 2011-2012, Woods-Murphy held a Fellowship as a United States Department of Education Teaching Ambassador where she shared her classroom and school expertise within a national education dialogue and facilitated discussions with educators across the country. For the last fourteen years, she has cochaired "Teens Talk About Racism," a New Jersey leadership conference held at Fairleigh Dickinson University for teens who want to create strategies to understand and stand up to racism in their schools and communities.

Woods-Murphy has more than 30 years in public education and currently holds a hybrid role as an elementary gifted and talented teacher and professional learning instructor for the Nutley, New Jersey School District. She has been a member of Delta Kappa Gamma since April 2014. She also has spread her educational message in appearances on *The Katie Couric Show, MSNBC*, *Telemundo* and *Univision* and has been published in blogs for EdWeek, US Department of Education, Center for Teaching Quality and the National Network of State Teachers of the Year to name just a few. This DKG member really makes a difference locally and nationally as a key woman educator.

Preserving Our Educational History - Court Street School: Then and Now

Presenter: Lillie Ham Hendry (Mu Chapter)

The Court Street School is one of the principal structures associated with the segregated history of early twentieth century education for African Americans in Freehold, New Jersey. The original school was organized in 1915, exclusively for the education of African American children by the Freehold Board of Education. It was a one-room wooden building located just west of the present site.

The existing school was constructed in two phases in 1920 and 1926. All African American children in Freehold were educated at Court Street School from kindergarten through eighth grade during World War II, when the school was used as an air raid shelter and a ration station. Under pressure from war veterans and the Supreme Court Brown vs. the Board of Education decision, the school system was integrated.

In 1990, the Court Street School Education Community Center, Inc. was formed as a non-profit, tax-exempt organization to restore the school for use as an Education Community Center and to preserve it as an historic landmark. The group received more than \$800,000 from the New Jersey Historic Trust and the Monmouth County Board of Freeholders to restore the facility. As a result of Mu Chapter's on-going support and a DKG New Jersey State Professional Growth Stipend, the Court Street School Board of Trustees was able to create an historic video for its archives. - *Excerpt from https://courtstreetschool.com/about-us*)

As we prepare for out 2019 convention, chapters are diligently working to recruit new inductees and reinstate former members. Each chapter has been charged with finding three new members and completing the Confirmation of Invitation to Membership form by the February 1st deadline. We must not lose sight of the fact that membership doesn't just happen. Continued efforts to recruit new and retain existing members are essential for DKG to thrive as a Society and carry out its mission.

International has afforded us great flexibility with the addition of collegiate membership and allowing members to belong to chapters outside of former geographical boundaries. Please consider the following when your chapter is looking for prospective members:

- A member may submit a recommendation for **membership to any chapter**.
- A former member shall be reinstated to membership by the chapter receiving the request. There are no restrictions, chapter or geographical, on reinstatement. The chapter does not vote on the reinstatement. There is no reinstatement fee.
- An active member is a woman, who at the time of her election, is employed as a professional educator or has retired from an educational position. In the selection of a member, the definition of professional educator is interpreted to include one-to-one instruction as well as group instruction.
- The chapter decides if the prospective member is classified as a professional educator.
- Certification or licensure is not required.
- A professional educator may be invited to membership regardless of where she lives or is employed unless a restriction is included in state organization bylaws.

Collegiate membership is now a membership

category and offered to graduate and undergraduate women students enrolled in education programs. They would pay the same dues as reserve members until they complete their programs and have professional jobs.

 Collegiate membership is not mandatory for your chapters. It gives those chapters that want to induct collegiate women an opportunity to mentor and support these women to develop their potential to be the very best educators they can be.

The work of the Membership Committee involves much more than finding new members. We know that for chapters to be successful, we must encourage chapter members to become more involved. We know that when members are involved, they retain their membership longer. We need to support all members, engage them in committee work and encourage development of their leadership skills. The rewards of membership bear a direct relationship to each individual's commitment.

Membership in Delta Kappa Gamma provides:

- Leadership opportunities to build and enhance each member's leadership capacity to further her personal and professional development and enable her to accept leadership responsibilities;
